THIS WEEK'S THEME The world around us encourages us, and even pressures us, to seek to rise above others in status, wealth, and social acceptance. But this is not God's plan for us. God's Word teaches us that God is opposed to us excessively seeking these values, and that instead He gives grace to those who are humble servants of Jesus, rather than giving grace to the proud.

FIRST LESSON: Jeremiah 11:18-20

¹⁸The LORD made it known to me and I knew; then you showed me their deeds. ¹⁹But I was like a gentle lamb led to the slaughter. I did not know it was against me they devised schemes, saying, "Let us destroy the tree with its fruit, let us cut him off from the land of the living, that his name be remembered no more." ²⁰But, O LORD of hosts, who judges righteously, who tests the heart and the mind, let me see your vengeance upon them, for to you have I committed my cause.

PSALM 54

¹Save me, O God, by your Name; in your might, defend my cause.

²Hear my prayer, O God; give ear to the words of my mouth.

³For the arrogant have risen up against me, and the ruthless have sought my life, those who have no regard for God.

⁴Behold, God is my helper; it is the LORD who sustains my life.

⁵Render evil to those who spy on me; in your faithfulness, destroy them.

⁶I will offer you a freewill sacrifice and praise your name, O LORD, for it is good.

⁷For you have rescued me from every trouble, and my eye has seen the ruin of my foes.

SECOND LESSON: James 3:13-4:10

¹³Who is wise and understanding among you? By his good conduct let him show his works in the meekness of wisdom. ¹⁴But if you have bitter jealousy and selfish ambition in your hearts, do not boast and be false to the truth. ¹⁵This is not the wisdom that comes down from above, but is earthly, unspiritual, demonic. ¹⁶For where jealousy and selfish ambition exist, there will be disorder and every vile practice. ¹⁷But the wisdom from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, open to reason, full of mercy and good fruits, impartial and sincere. ¹⁸And a harvest of righteousness is sown in peace by those who make peace.

¹What causes quarrels and what causes fights among you? Is it not this, that your passions are at war within you? ²You desire and do not have, so you murder. You covet and cannot obtain, so you fight and quarrel. You do not have, because you do not ask. ³You ask and do not receive, because you ask wrongly, to spend it on your passions. ⁴You adulterous people! Do you not know that friendship with the world is enmity with God? Therefore whoever wishes to be a friend of the world makes himself an enemy of God. ⁵Or do you suppose it is to no purpose that the Scripture says, "He yearns jealously over the spirit that he has made to dwell in us"? ⁶But he gives more grace. Therefore it says, "God opposes the proud but gives grace to the humble." ⁷Submit yourselves therefore to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you. ⁸Draw near to God, and he will draw near to you. Cleanse your hands, you sinners, and purify your hearts, you double-minded. ⁹Be wretched and mourn and weep. Let your laughter be turned to mourning and your joy to gloom. ¹⁰Humble yourselves before the Lord, and he will exalt you.

THE HOLY GOSPEL: Mark 9:30-37

³⁰{Jesus and his disciples} went on from there and passed through Galilee. And he did not want anyone to know, ³¹for he was teaching his disciples, saying to them, "The Son of Man is going to be delivered into the hands of men, and they will kill him. And when he is killed, after three days he will rise." ³²But they did not understand the saying, and were afraid to ask him. ³³And they came to Capernaum. And when he was in the house he asked them, "What were you discussing on the

way?" ³⁴But they kept silent, for on the way they had argued with one another about who was the greatest. ³⁵And he sat down and called the twelve. And he said to them, "If anyone would be first, he must be last of all and servant of all." ³⁶And he took a child and put him in the midst of them, and taking him in his arms, he said to them, ³⁷"Whoever receives one such child in my name receives me, and whoever receives me, receives not me but him who sent me."

Seventeenth Sunday after Trinity | September 22, 2024



LUKE 14:1-11

"[The Pharisees] were watching [Jesus] carefully." (Vs. 1)

The Pharisees, those pious and religious practitioners of the law, were keeping a wary eye on Jesus. They had heard, perhaps, that he and his disciples did not obey the letter of the law as fastidiously as did the Pharisees. Maybe they had been told by some of their colleagues that Jesus and his crowd gleaned grain and ate it on the Sabbath (Lk. 6:1). Maybe they had witnessed Jesus violating the Sabbath by healing a man with a withered hand (Lk. 6:9-11). However those Pharisees might have come to that Sabbath dinner with Jesus as the invited guest, they certainly did come to catch out Jesus in a Sabbath violation.

We are not told of how the man with dropsy came to be there or how he was presented to Jesus. We can, though, be pretty certain that the man would not have been in the house had not the ruler of the Pharisees permitted it. Jesus is presented with a dilemma: he can obey the law, do no healing, and let the man remain in his affliction... or he can act lovingly, break the law, heal the man, and free him of his affliction. Obedience or love, Jesus turns the dilemma back upon the lawyers and Pharisees (Lk. 14:3 & 5). Jesus receives only silence; they will not answer whether they will follow the letter of the law or the spirit of the law.

We are told by Jesus that the two greatest commandments are these: love your God with all you've got and love your neighbor as you would love yourself (Mt. 22:36-40). Jesus holds these commands to love both God and neighbor as the fountainhead of all the law and the prophets. Love is the spirit of the law. Simple obedience to the letter of the law... merely following the rules... will not prove you to be consistently loving. Obedience may allow you to justify yourself by saying, "I followed the law! I did not sin!" Such supposed obedience of yours fails to love your neighbor and convicts you of a deeper sin. The juxtaposition of the righteousness of obedience versus the righteousness of love is the context for Luther's well-known declaration. "Sin boldly! But believe in the grace of God even more boldly." God graciously forgives sin so that the supposed righteousness of your obedience will not prevent you from acting in love.

Table Talk: Discuss instances when you or others may have followed the letter of the law but proved unloving.

Pray: Father, hold me in the forgiveness of sins so that I dare to love even if it breaks the law. Amen
