## "Blessed is the nation whose God is the LORD, the people whom he has chosen as his heritage!" Psalm 33:12 A Message from Pastor Doug Hefner

When we think of July, we automatically think of our nation's birthday (July 4, 1776) and the celebration of Independence Day. Our country's ancestors had a vision for a new nation and a new way of life and government as they wrote the Declaration of Independence, declaring our nation's independence from England. In the Declaration of Independence we read these words, "We hold these truths to be self-evident that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness." Let us give thanks to God for the freedoms we enjoy as a nation and remember the people who sacrificed so much for that to be possible. Someone has said that "the temptation is to enjoy the fruits of citizenship without tending the tree of liberty." We are called to tend the tree of liberty by acts of service and sacrifice in our own generation; to keep this vision alive and moving forward.

The greatest freedom we know is the freedom that has been given to us in Christ Jesus. Jesus said in John 8: "If you continue in my word, you are truly my disciples; and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free... So if the Son makes you free, you will be free indeed." In John 8 Jesus reminds us that we are all slaves to sin and because of that sin, we are separated from God and one another. Jesus died for us on the cross and rose again so that we might be forgiven and welcomed into the body of Christ, the Church. Jesus reminds us that we are to continue in God's Word so that we will know the truth of our sinful situation and what God did for us in Christ to bring us reconciliation and freedom. The truth of God's love for us in Christ sets us free from sin,

death and the devil. We are most free when we fully surrender to the Lord Jesus – every part of our lives!

We are set free to glorify God, to love, serve and worship God, and love our neighbor as ourselves. St. Paul writes in *Galatians 5:1, 13 For freedom Christ has set us free.*Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery. <sup>13</sup> For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters; only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become slaves to one another. <sup>14</sup> For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." St. Paul reminds us that those who are free in Christ become His servants by serving others. We are called to use our God-given freedom to make a difference in the world. Indeed we love the freedoms God has granted to us, but let us also live in those freedoms as we follow our Lord and serve Him as we love and serve others in His name. Let us proclaim the freedom Christ has won for all people and let us not use our freedom for our own self-indulgence and sinful selfishness. Whenever we are exercising our "freedoms" we must always ask ourselves, "As I do this am I living up to God's call to love and to care for my neighbor as myself?"

As we gather to remember and celebrate the freedoms that we enjoy in America, let us first remember and give thanks to God for our true freedom in Christ. We are forgiven in Christ and we are set free in love to live in Christ's love and to love others in Christ's name. Let us celebrate and give thanks for the freedoms we enjoy as God's people and as Americans. May we not forget that we are called to live in those same freedoms and serve others in Jesus' name. The best way to live out our freedoms as Americans is to live in the freedom of Christ and His promises and call to earthly and heavenly citizenship!

# <u>Summer Sermon Series on the Parables of Jesus:</u> "The Amazing Life-Changing/Challenging Stories of Jesus"

We all love a good story, especially the stories that capture our attention and imagination. A good story will always have some kind of impact upon us. Some stories inspire us; others challenge us and make us think about life and faith in new ways. That's why we remember stories, either fact or fiction, that teach us important lessons and call us to a new way of living. There are about 40 parables in the gospels that Jesus used to teach us about God and God's Kingdom principles. One of the best definitions I have heard of a parable is that it is "an earthly story with a kingdom or heavenly principle to teach us." Nelson's New Illustrated Bible Dictionary gives this definition: "a parable is a short, simple story designed to communicate spiritual truth, a religious principle, or

moral lesson; a figure of speech in which truth is illustrated by a comparison or example drawn from everyday experiences." The Greek word for parable literally means to "place something alongside of;" in the case of a parable, it is a story that is placed alongside of a spiritual truth to illustrate that truth so that we might understand the truth and apply it to our lives. Jesus told a parable about hearing and applying God's Word or Story in our lives (Matthew 7:24-29) as He concluded His Sermon on the Mount. The wise person hears God's Word and applies it faithfully. They are like the wise person who built their house upon the rock. When the storms come, as they will do in our lives, the wise person's home and life had a strong foundation and withstood the power of the storm. Those who don't hear God's Word or don't apply it to their lives are like the foolish person who built his house upon the sand.

As Jesus traveled through the countryside teaching about the Kingdom of God, he would often tell stories about everyday events that were happening right before them, like the Parables of the Sower and the Different Types of Soil (Mark 4, Luke 8, Matthew 13), the Wheat and Tares (Matthew 13), and the Mustard Seed (Matthew 13). Jesus used stories to teach important principles like forgiveness and reconciliation like the Parables of the Prodigal Son (Luke 15), the Unforgiving Servant (Matthew 18), and the Parable of the Creditor and Two Debtors (Luke 7). When Jesus taught about the importance of prayer he used the stories of The Persistent Widow (Luke 18) and the Friend in need at midnight (Luke 11). Jesus taught stories about humility (the Pharisee and Tax Collector-Luke 18 and the Lowest Seat in the house-Luke 14); about God's gracious invitation (Parable of the Great Supper Luke 14 and Parable of the Wedding Feast-Matthew 22); about individual responsibility (Parable of the Talents –Matthew 25, Parable of the Wise and Foolish Bridesmaids-Matthew 25); about the cost of discipleship and faithfulness (Parables of the builder and king at war-Luke 14, Parables the Watchful Servants and the Faithful/Evil Servants-Luke 12). These stories help to illustrate the grace and love of God in our lives: the Story, the Word made flesh, the Good News, the Living Word, Jesus Christ.

I will be preaching on the parables of our Lord in the upcoming weeks. Here is an outline of the sermon series based on the parables of Jesus. I will use mainly St. Luke since we are focusing on St. Luke this year, unless the parable is found only in another Gospel.

<u>July 6</u> – Parable of the Sower and Types of Soil (Luke 8:4-15) "The Master Gardener" Parables of the Treasure, Pearl of Great Price(Matthew 13), The Builder, King in Battle (Luke 14) "The Treasure and Cost of Freedom" – A special Independence Day Message. <u>July 13</u> – More Seeds! The Wheat and the Tares, The Mustard Seed, Yeast (Matthew 13:24-43) – "In the Hands of God, the Small Become Great"

- <u>July 20</u> Parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-37) "Taking Care of (Kingdom) Business!"
- <u>July 27</u> Parable of the Rich Fool (Luke 12)/Parable the Rich Man and Lazarus (Luke 16) "Bigger Barns or Bigger Hearts?
- <u>August 3</u> Parables of Persistent Widow, Friend in Need at Midnight "Living on a Prayer!"
- <u>August 10</u> Parables of the Lowest Seat, Pharisee and Publican "O Lord it's Hard to be Humble"
- <u>August 17</u> Parable of the Great Dinner, Invitation, Luke 14:15-24, Wedding Feast Matthew 22:2-14
- <u>August 24</u> Back to School Blessing of the Bookbags, Parables about wise living: The Parable of the Ten Bridesmaids Matthew 25:1-13 and the Parable of the Talents (Matthew 25:14-30)
- <u>August 31</u> Parables about the Coming of Christ Parable of The Faithful and Unfaithful Servants as They Await The Masters Return (Matthew 24:45-51) and the Parable of the Sheep and Goats (Matthew 25:31-46)

#### **CONGREGATIONAL MEETING SET FOR AUGUST 17**

In May, Pastor Doug, Rick and Cindy Bivens, and Todd Childers attended the Carolina's Mission Region Convocation. During the business portion of the meeting, a resolution was passed by the assembly. However, it must also be voted on by each congregation for it to be approved. It is a very simple resolution, basically updating the language and the number of lay delegates who can attend the Region convocation. We will have a simple vote, probably by hands, voting yes for the change or no for the change. Here is the current article with the proposed change below it.

Current Article 7.02 Delegates with voting privileges at a Convocation of the Carolinas Mission Region, or any Convocation of a member Mission District (see Art. 7.05), shall be the ordained ministers of the Mission Districts that comprise the Carolinas Mission Region of the NALC and the official lay delegates of the congregations of the Mission Districts in the Carolinas. Each congregation of the Carolinas Mission Region of the NALC shall elect one lay delegate to the Convocation for every 400 baptized members, or fraction thereof, of such congregation. In the event that the total number of lay delegates elected pursuant to the preceding sentence is less than the total number of ordained clergy, the Regional Council of the Carolinas Mission Region of the NALC (or, in the case of a specially called Mission District Convocation, the Regional Council representatives of the Mission District in question) shall apportion additional lay delegates based on the relative size of the congregations in the member Mission Districts. **Proposed change to Article 7.02** Those with voting responsibilities at a Convocation of the Carolinas Mission Region, or any Convocation of a member Mission District, shall be the ordained ministers of the Mission Districts that comprise the Carolinas Mission Region of the NALC and the official lay delegates of the congregations of the Mission Region and Mission Districts. Each congregation may send up to two lay delegates to the annual CMR Convocation and Mission District Convocations. Lay persons chosen by their congregations to represent them at the Convocation are delegates. Clergy and delegates have voice and vote.
